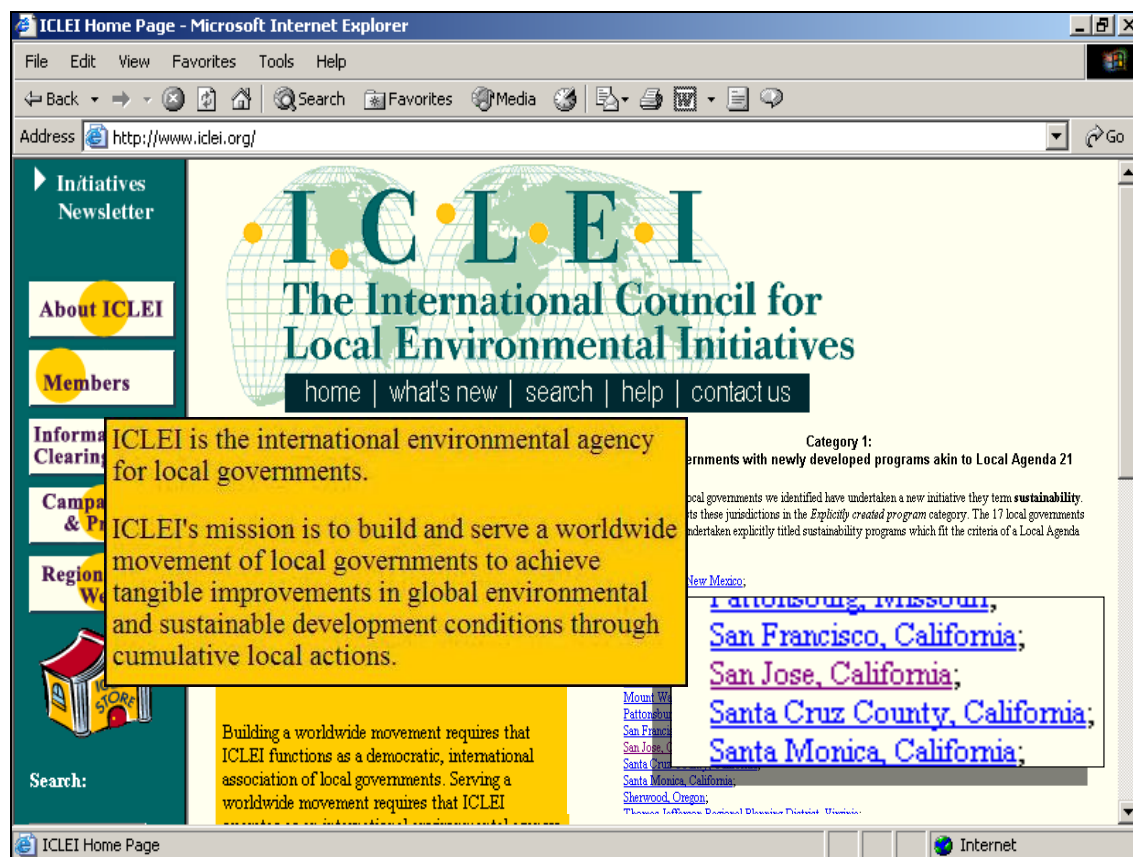


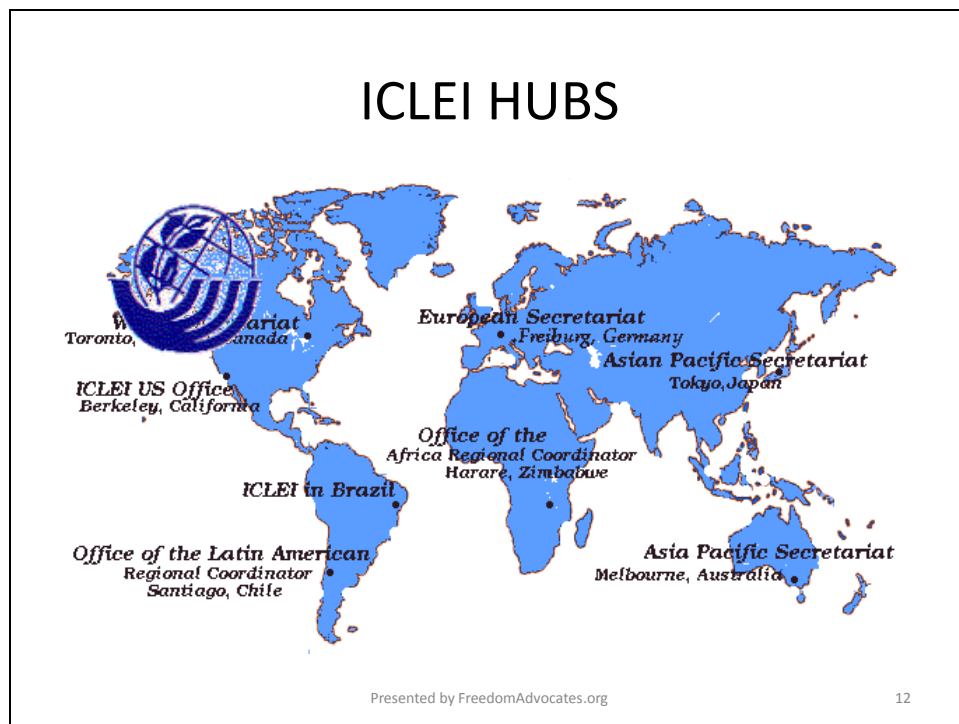

a. Make it burn!

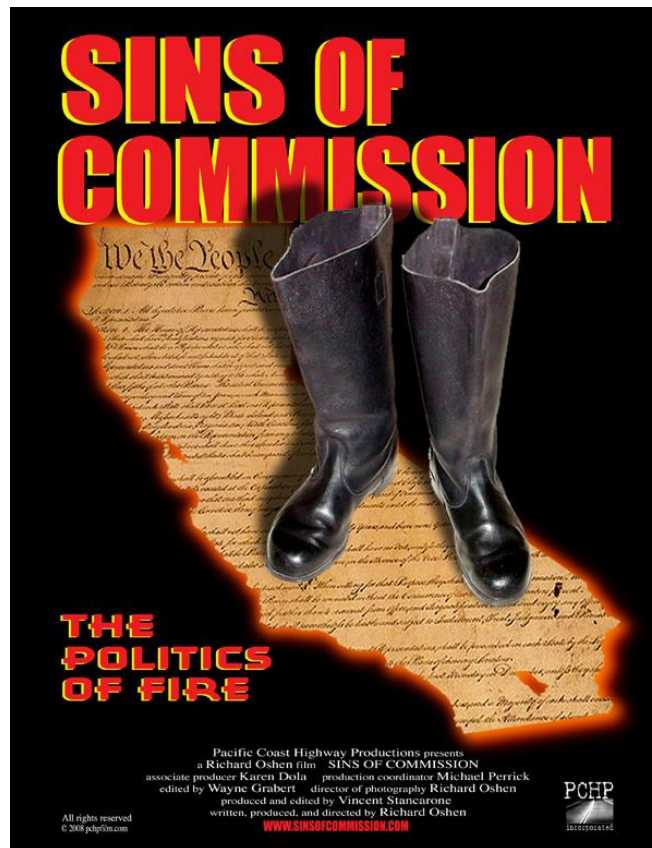
Land management policy now requires that underbrush remain unmanaged. Often government policy prohibits even selective harvesting of timber. The consequence is catastrophic fire.

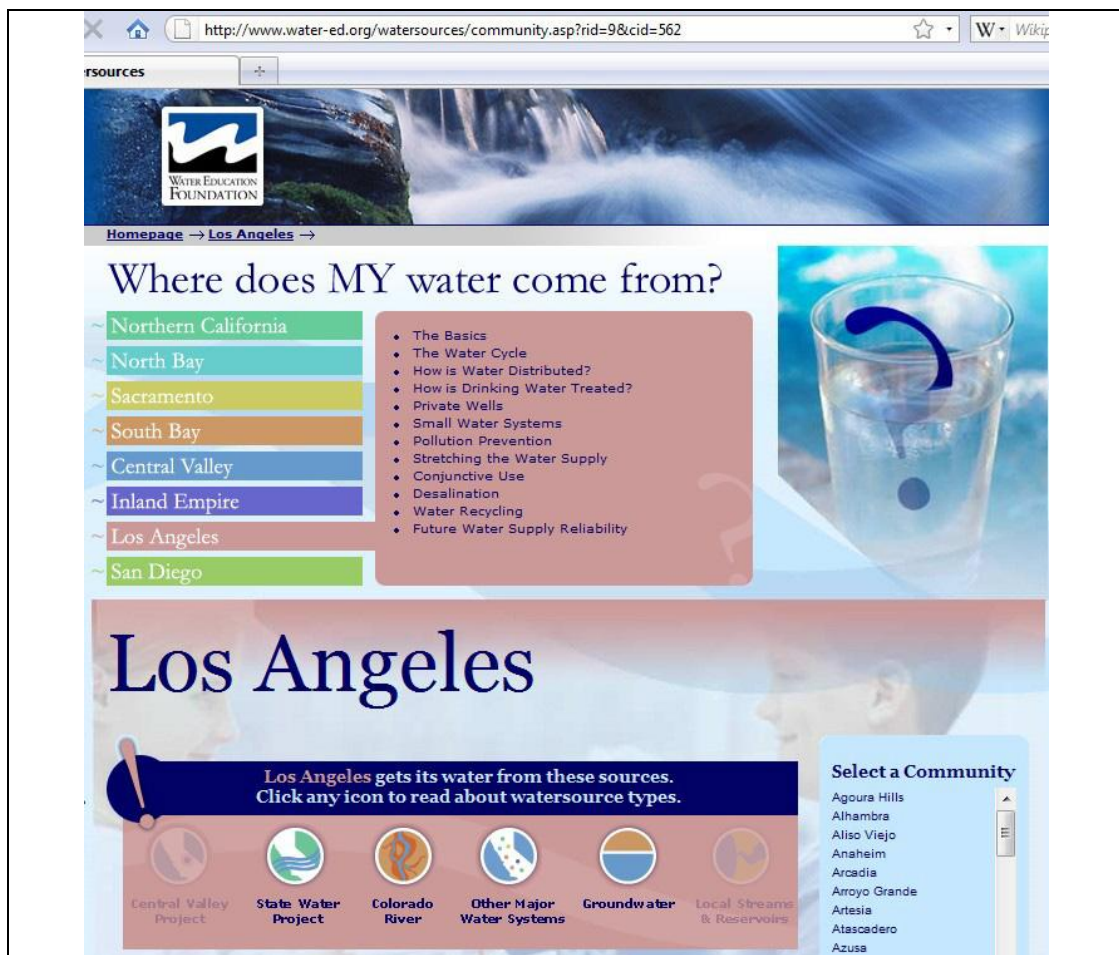

b. Water.


Control the water and you control the people. Globalism clearly seeks to change water policy and law. To date they have succeeded in reducing California's water supply.

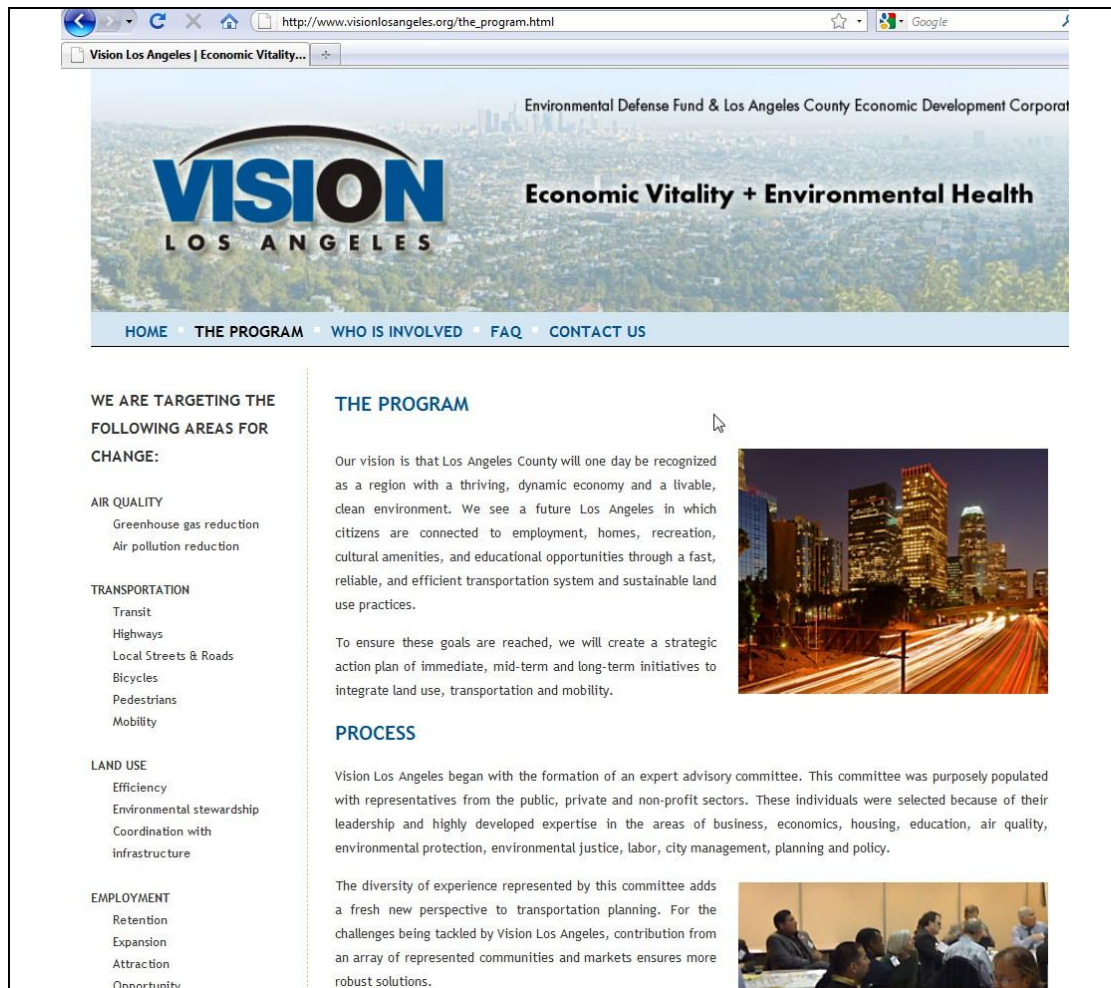

**PROCESS**

Vision Los Angeles began with the formation of an expert advisory committee. This committee was purposely populated with representatives from the public, private and non-profit sectors. These individuals were selected because of their leadership and highly developed expertise in the areas of business, economics, housing, education, air quality, environmental protection, environmental justice, labor, city management, planning and policy.

The diversity of experience represented by this committee adds a fresh new perspective to transportation planning. For the challenges being tackled by Vision Los Angeles, contribution from an array of represented communities and markets ensures more robust solutions.



In October and December 2008, the group assembled to discuss and define the objectives, constraints, growth forecasts, and outputs of Vision Los Angeles. Jointly, the guiding principles of Environment, Economy and Equity were agreed upon.

In March 2009, advisory committee members participated in a planning simulation charrette and analyzed opportunities for transportation enhancements and growth in various subregions of the County. Using maps that indicated existing and planned growth, land uses, and transportation infrastructure, groups reached consensus for the placement of new housing, transportation enhancements and network alterations. In these small groups, the different perspectives within the committee benefited from mediation and joint problem solving.

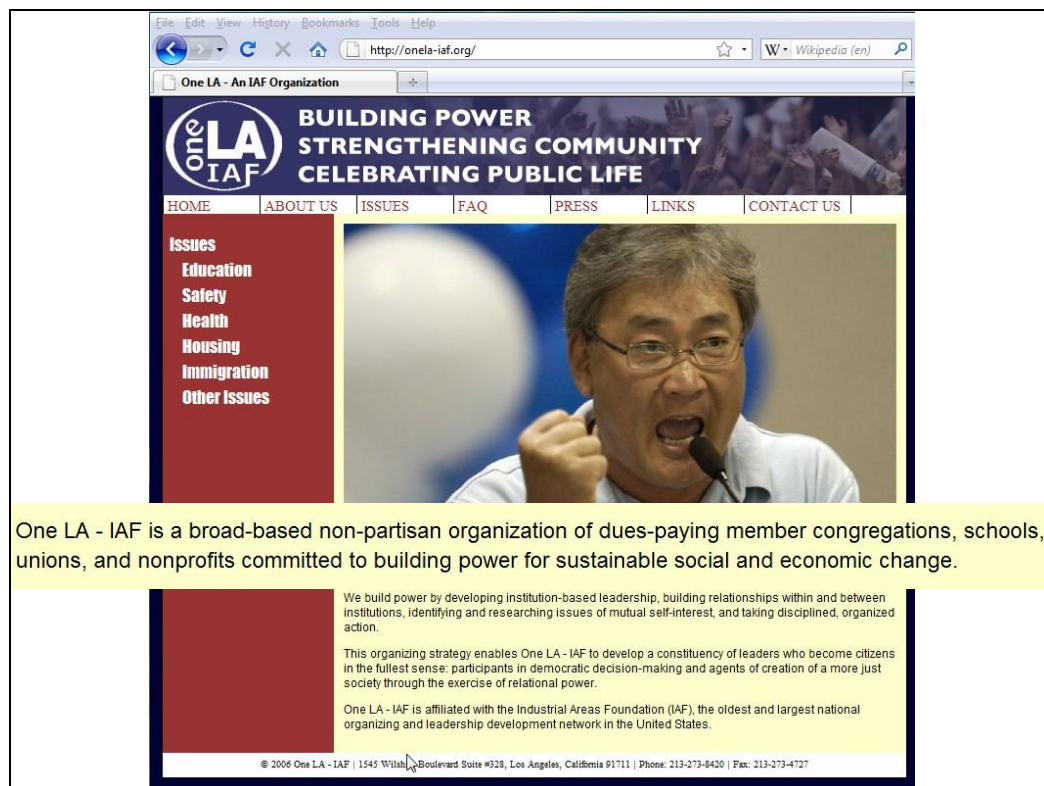
Throughout spring 2009, the advisory committee and its consultants will continue to meet regularly and analyze all of the subregions of Los Angeles County. The results of these plenary sessions will then be synthesized and analyzed by CD+A and Fehr & Peers, two nationally acclaimed planning and land-use and transportation consulting firms. Their analysis will result in recommendations to be further developed by the advisory committee. Then a broader spectrum of agencies and groups will be engaged for feedback on the recommendations.

**The long-term goal for Vision Los Angeles is a strategic game plan that can help achieve economic and environmental sustainability through actionable measures.**

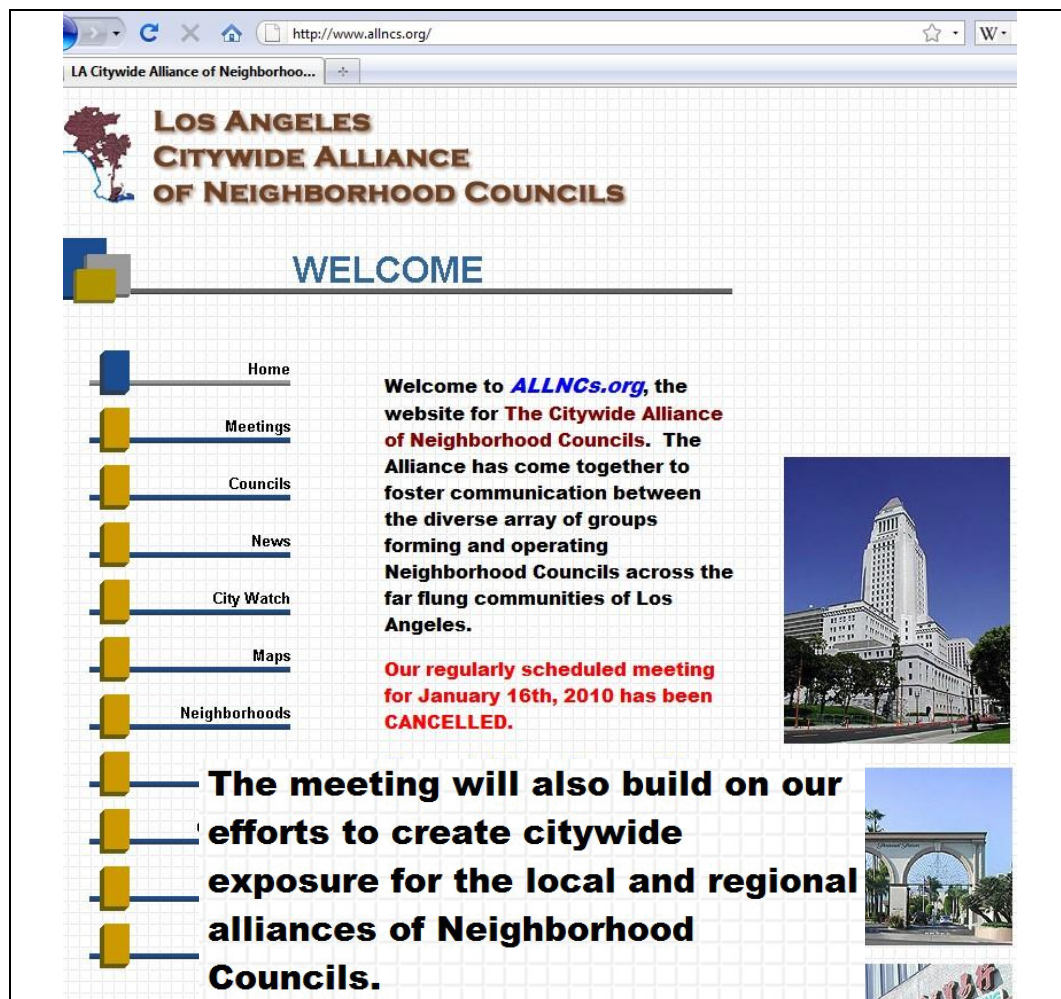

Southland Wildlands – This program has been defeated – But don't rest because it will resurface with a new name and organizations promoting it.




